## Spouses Are Often overlooked.

Spouses of sex addicts are often overlooked, their anger unacknowledged, their hurt left unhealed. They have been betrayed and they have been lied to. Their world has been turned upside down and...

...the hurt they experience as a result of their spouses actions is often every bit as painful for them as hitting rock bottom is for the addict.

This pain, although experienced to some degree throughout the time their spouse was in active addiction, often becomes more acute at the time of disclosure or catching the spouse "red handed." Ironically, the addict often feels relief when the secret is out and they no longer have the stress and anxiety of being exposed.

The spouses of addicts will almost always feel some type of responsibility for the addict's behavior and have feelings that they were inadequate or not enough.

It may be that the addict or another unknowledgeable individual has actually made the accusation. It is important for both the addict and spouse to understand that one hundred percent (100%) of the responsibility of the choices made to act out sexually and/or lie to cover them up falls on the spouse who carried out the behavior. That's right 100%!

Although it is true that many marriages have not survived the damage caused by sexual addiction, the opportunity for the relationship to reach a point of true intimacy is not possible until the addiction is fully known.

It may very well be that the marriage which seems hopeless and dead can now, with God's help, resurrect to become the embodiment of true intimacy.

One hundred percent (100%) of the responsibility of the choices made to act out sexually and/or lie to cover them up falls on the spouse who carried out the behavior.
