There Are Many Questions

The road to true intimacy for a marriage that has been damaged by sexual addiction is bumpy at best. The trust that has been broken is a foundational piece needed in order for the relationship to reach God's model for marriage.

Figuring out how to rebuild that trust and what happens if trust continues to be broken are just two of the issues that every couple in this situation will have to face.

For those who are willing to try, please understand, you do not have to face these issues alone. Though you may have never been in this situation before, God has been there. He has led many through this dark valley to the mountain top. He knows the way and will also provide others to assist you on the journey.

Trained therapists, recovery groups/support groups, friends and family who understand, are all available to walk beside you and encourage you through this process. But they cannot help unless you are willing to ask and then accept their help.

Undoubtedly, both you and your spouse have many questions. Although there are commonalities between couples who have endured this experience, every couple is unique. Some things will work for one marriage that won't work for others. This is the reason seeking help from a trained therapist, with experience in these matters, is important.

Remember, sexual addiction is not about sex. There is much work to be done by both of you. It is not as easy as simply figuring out how to stop the unwanted behavior.

A therapist who is trained in addiction, trauma and family systems, and who is a Christian, is typically the best option to help you do your work.
