Heads In The Sand?

The most alarming phenomenon may be the influence, or should I say, the non-influence of the church in helping sexual addicts. "Pornography problem? Sexual addiction? Not here. Not my church. Not our leaders. Not my family. Not me. No need to talk about it. No need to worry about it."

Sexual sin has long been the intentionally, unseen, dead elephant in the pews of many congregations.

The advent of the Internet has compounded the problem with hundreds of sexual and pornography addicts being added to the pile weekly.

Intentional avoidance leaves the addict trapped. He simultaneously prays for a "Good Samaritan" to come to his aid, but also for the congregation to leave him alone to suffer his well-deserved consequences in seclusion. Most times the latter prayer gets answered. Another man, another woman, another spouse, another parent, another marriage, another family, slowly disappears. They do so as the church looks on, fearful and frozen in their self-imposed silence.

So, which is the bigger problem in the church? The individual who avoids the hardships of reality by consistently returning to a world of pornographic fantasy, or the congregation which buries its head in the sand, preferring their own fantasy that pornography and sex addiction are not issues? Especially not issues in this congregation.
