Churches Must Provide Leadership

The question of whether pornography is prevalent in the church has long been answered. Study after study shows that at least 25% and typically closer to 50% of Christian men regularly view pornography.

The issues that result are numerous; stagnate church growth, lack of leadership, divorce, financial problems and sexual abuse, to name but a few. Yet, pornography and sexual addiction are rarely mentioned in an assembly. Even more rare is a church that has an organized, consistent, and effective plan to help those struggling.

Consider your congregation. How many prayer requests involve sexual issues? How many men and women are open about their struggles with pornography, affairs, compulsive masturbation, or lust? How often are women/teens specifically asked to wear something more appropriate and modest? How many sermons and classes directly confront sexual sin and sexual addiction?

How many congregations facilitate a recovery group for sexual addiction? How many congregations provide counseling with qualified therapists for those who are caught up in sexual addiction? Honest answers to these questions will show the current level of understanding and involvement of your church family in providing help and hope for the members caught in the web of pornography and sexual addiction.

Freedom from sexual addiction is possible. The church's role is vital.

Satan would have you believe otherwise. Satan works through deceit, secrets, and avoidance with the hope that the truth about sexual addiction among Christians will remain in the closet. Jesus said, "The truth will set you free." Is your congregation ready to be set free?
